


Members Forum: "Artistic Effects" by Betsy Wilson


New member, Rob Porter, is in the spotlight this month!

Rob is a relatively new member, as he just joined us this past October. He seems to be enjoying us so far; he's been on various outings and had winning images in some contests and competitions. He shared that "it's good to see everybody's different interests and styles. I'm impressed by the caliber of people's work."

He's been involved with photography for several years. He started with Black & White in a darkroom in the late '70's through early '80s, then like many of us, got out of it for a while. He started back up when digital cameras appeared on the scene. He had one of the first "real" digital cameras, an Olympus with a whopping 1.6 MP!!! Wow! He remembers it fondly as a nice camera.

Rob's favorite type of photography and his main focus is still life. The photo to the right shows two of his framed images, the bottom one being a Blue Ribbon winner at the Philadelphia Flower Show this year. When he travels, he enjoys cathedral interiors and occasionally does some glamour work.

Prior to his retirement, Rob was an ER doctor for 20 years, then worked for Merck for another 20 as editor-in-chief of the Merck Manuals, which consisted of several medical books and websites.
