The Year of the Print!

If you were around in 1976 you may remember a song by Al Stewart called *The Year of the Cat.* Well, it's now 2022 and Chester County Camera Club is proclaiming it as *The Year of the Print!*

Printing is a way to showcase your images and share your artistic endeavors; to display your art in your home or in a gallery. You made a choice when and why to make a particular image – it meant something to you when you clicked the shutter and you likely were pleased when you saw it large and on your computer screen. Why not go even larger and get more pleasure! Print it, frame it, and put it on a wall!!

One of the old school photography sayings is, "A *Photograph isn't Complete Until it's a Print.*" This was especially true in the days of film; a negative certainly wasn't considered a photograph. The same principle can apply today: a digital negative isn't considered a photograph.

If this has you thinking you want to try your hand at printing, we're here to help! <u>Jim Samanen</u> and other members shown above recently discussed printing in a Members' Forum and <u>Buzz Mossholder</u> will lead a workshop on printing in November.
